states and nation. Applications about the contributions of under-represented communities are highly encouraged. Projects may encompass the period from pre-1776 through the present day.

Funding Opportunities

"A More Perfect Union" encourages projects that:

- strengthen the nation's humanities infrastructure to make it available to future generations
- advance civic education and knowledge of the country's core principles of government
- help Americans understand the experiences of service members and veterans and assist them in returning to civilian life

Special funding emphasis is available for:

- short documentaries of thirty minutes or less on American history and culture
- humanities discussions that feature at least six in-person programs related to the 250th anniversary
- documentary editing projects that make significant texts available to a wide audience
- preservation assistance for American history-focused collections held by small to mediumsized institutions

NEH is working with the Federation and 55 state and jurisdictional humanities councils to offer thought-provoking programming that fosters discussion and public engagement. The councils sponsor book festivals, literacy campaigns, speakers bureaus, teacher development, and more.
